### LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends.

Today, the past seems to have overtaken us, and education about the Jewish history of Eastern Europe and Russia has never been more important. Whether in the guise of left-wing antisemitism, right-wing White Supremacism, the war in Ukraine, or the questioning of Israel's right to exist (which often masks the question of whether the Jews have a right to exist), Jews are now more conscious of themselves as Jews than at any time since the 1920s. Outright lies, distorted history, contempt toward Jewish history and accomplishments are ubiquitous in national media and in public as well as private institutions, on many college and university campuses today, from the most elite to the least. The enormous tragedy of Jews turning against Jews in an environment of fear and ignorance can be witnessed across America.

Our children must have the intellectual and psychological tools with which to defend themselves and to understand the difference between truth and lies. Slogans are not enough. Wrapping oneself in a flag is not enough. YIVO's lectures, classes, seminars, conferences, online exhibitions, and more offer essential knowledge. The recently created Learning and Media Center featuring state-of-the-art, interactive multi-media equipment in modern premises will debut this coming spring, and we are now in the final stages of creating the first Masters degree-granting program in Yiddish Language and Civilization.

Throughout Jewish history, in the 1920s and '30s, in the Shoah and the founding of the State of Israel, great examples of courage, leadership, and inner strength, from the smallest acts of defiance to the greatest acts of valor, linked the Jewish people around the world. Transmitting that inner strength and confidence to our children is the challenge YIVO faces in its present work and, as we approach our centennial, in our vision for the future. With your partnership, YIVO can sustain and strengthen these vital programs and activities and amplify their impact around the world. Become a part of YIVO's effort to build a future of knowledge and strength.

# Spring 2024 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

### CARNEGIE HALL'S FALL OF THE WEIMAR REPUBLIC: DANCING ON THE PRECIPICE FESTIVAL

(FEBRUARY 21, MARCH 27, AND MAY 7) YIVO hosted three events as part of Carnegie Hall's Fall of the Weimar Republic: Dancing on the Precipice festival. The festival explored one of the most complex and consequential chapters in modern history: Germany's Weimar Republic of 1919-1933. In the first event, The Reality of Myth for Yiddish Writers in Weimar Germany, Marc Caplan examined the historical significance and legendary allure of Weimar culture by considering three of its most significant Yiddish writers: Moyshe Kulbak, Dovid Bergelson, and Pinkhes Kahanovitsh (known as Der Nister, the hidden one). For the second event, Yiddish and Hebrew Little Magazines in the Weimar Republic, Barbara Mann explored the publishing history of the distinctly portable and collaborative Yiddish and Hebrew "little magazines" that blended poetry, manifestos, and visual arts to create a unique form of cultural expression. The final event, Yiddish and Hebrew Song in the Weimar Republic, was a concert exploring Yiddish and Hebrew songs of the Weimar Republic, showcasing the rich musical activity of the Weimar Republic that bridged Jewish composers in the East and West.

### DREW FRIEDMAN: VERMEER OF THE BORSCHT BELT

(APRIL 1) YIVO presented a sold-out screening of a new documentary, Drew Friedman: Vermeer of the Borscht Belt, that traces artist Drew Friedman's evolution from underground comics to the cover of The New Yorker. The film, directed by Kevin Dougherty, features interviews with Friedman's friends and colleagues, including Gilbert Gottfried, Patton Oswalt, Richard Kind, Mike Judge, Merrill Markoe and many others. Following the film, YIVO Senior Academic Advisor & Director of Exhibitions Eddy Portnoy led a panel discussion with Friedman, Dougherty, actors Craig Bierko and Richard Kind, comedy writer Tom Leopold, and co-host of Gilbert Gottfried's Amazing Colossal Podcast Frank Santopadre.

### **HOMES OF THE PAST**

(JUNE 24) Among the Jews who arrived in the United States in the early 1940s were a small number of Polish scholars who had devoted their professional lives to the study of Europe's Yiddish-speaking Jews at the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research. Faced with the devastating knowledge that returning to their former homes and resuming their scholarly work there was no longer viable, they sought to document the European Jewish lives, places, and ways of living that were being destroyed. YIVO scholars determinedly pursued this undertaking for several years, publicizing the initiative and collecting materials to exhibit. However, the Museum of the Homes of the Past was abandoned shortly after the war ended. Author Jeffrey Shandler and professor Deborah Dash Moore discussed Shandler's new book, *Homes of the Past: A Lost Jewish Museum*, which explores this abandoned project.







### YIVO LAUNCHES THE SECOND INTERACTIVE EXHIBITION OF THE YIVO ONLINE MUSEUM:

## YITSKHOK RUDASHEVSKI: A TEENAGER'S ACCOUNT OF LIFE AND DEATH IN THE VILNA GHETTO

In July, YIVO launched *Yitskhok Rudashevski: A Teenager's Account of Life and Death in the Vilna Ghetto*, the second exhibition of the digitally native YIVO Bruce and Francesca Cernia Slovin Online Museum. It is now available free of charge to the global public at **museum.yivo.org**.

A broad-ranging educational initiative, the YIVO Cernia Slovin Online Museum seeks to teach Jewish history through

primary source material presented virtually. The new exhibition explores Jewish life in the Vilna Ghetto (1941-43) through the contemporaneous diary of a teenage boy that was miraculously discovered after World War II and has been preserved in the YIVO Archives in New York City.

Before the mass murder of the Jews of Europe, each victim was a real person with hopes, dreams, and a vibrant life. One such person was Yitskhok Rudashevski, a teenager in Vilna with a talent for writing and a passion for politics and Jewish cultural life. Yits-

khok, tragically murdered in the killing pits of Ponar in 1943, left behind a diary that chronicles his own and his community's experiences in the Ghetto.

The exhibition, developed by YIVO in consultation with eminent scholars, delivers an exciting leap forward for digital museums and Jewish and Holocaust education. It includes animation, graphic novels, video dramatizations, and a host of other interactive features. Karolina Ziulkoski, the museum's Chief Curator and a Webby Award-winning interactive designer, has combined innovative technology with engaging storytelling to bring Yitskhok's tragic journey to life.

Through the exhibition, we gain insights into cultural resistance, moral dilemmas, and the fierce passions of this young boy

in the face of dire adversity.

The exhibition includes virtual reproductions of rare artifacts translated into English, including Rudashevski's original diary entries and documents Rudashevski himself looked at and made use of in his life. "The artifacts in the exhibition offer a visceral connection to the past," said Ziulkoski.

The exhibition includes a range of teacher resources and is targeted for high school and early college students, teachers and professors, historians, and anyone interested in the Holocaust and Jewish history.

The YIVO Bruce and Francesca Cernia Slovin Online Museum was established in 2018 with a generous \$3 million gift from Bruce Slovin in memory of his late wife Francesca Cernia Slovin. The Online Museum's purpose is to tell the story of Jewish life in Eastern Europe and Russia through YIVO's world-renowned archival and library collections.



### WHAT'S IN AN ARCHIVAL BOX?


In the Archives, an archival box holds folders with collections materials. The YIVO Learning and Media Center (YLMC)—our new project to host visiting class groups—features activities using curated archival boxes containing high quality reproductions of actual YIVO archival materials. Some documents include accompanying translations; some are left untranslated. One such box is titled "Esther."

"Esther" was the pseudonym chosen by an 18-year-old woman when she submitted her autobiography to YIVO's third Youth Autobiography Contest. She was from a Gerer Hasidic family, had attended Beys Yaakov and Polish schools as a child, and at 17 was tasked with leaving her family and hometown of Grójec, Poland to start a Beys Yaakov school somewhere along the Vistula River.

"Esther" was one of hundreds of anonymous autobiography writers who sent their work to YIVO in the 1930s. While many were destroyed during the war, roughly a third survived and are housed in our collection today where they are still used by scholars of interwar Eastern European Jewish life.

Four of the autobiographies were selected for the YLMC's first archival box lesson. While we plan to expand our repertoire in the future, the writings of these Jewish youth were selected because they not only provide a rich view of the diversity of Jewish life in interwar Eastern Europe, but also because their collection in itself exemplifies the early ethos of and commitment to Jewish life and history that drove the establishment of YIVO.

> Each of the four autobiographies we use has a box with curated materials that relate to what the young writers describe in their work. This material ranges from Yiddish newspapers describing antisemitic incidents in Poland to children's schoolwork from TSYSHO to photos of Bundist and Zionist youth groups. These four are the first group in a series of planned archival box lessons that will draw from YIVO's archives.

# **NEWS** FROM YIVO

**JONATHAN BRENT ATTENDS MEETING OF AFRICAN AMERICAN AND JEWISH COMMUNITY LEADERS** 

In April, New York Mayor Eric Adams invited YIVO Executive Director & CEO Jonathan Brent to participate in an African American and Jewish community leaders meeting. The meeting was held at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture in Harlem. During the session, Brent presented

artifacts from YIVO's archive on the civil rights movement that represented the connection between the Jewish and African American communities. Amongst the materials presented was a booklet containing Yiddish translations of the poetry of Langston Hughes. Unbeknownst to Brent at the time of selecting materials to share, Hughes's ashes are buried under the floorboards of the Schomburg Center, so it was indeed a very fitting artifact to show.

This event is another example of the vast breadth of the YIVO Archives and the ability to use them to work with other communities to create shared understanding and connection.

### COUNCIL **MEMBER BOTTCHER VISITS THE YIVO ARCHIVES**

We were pleased to welcome New York City Council Member Erik Bottcher to YIVO on March 20. Touring the YIVO Archives, Council Member Bottcher marveled at the fact that the world's

largest collection of materials related to East European Jewry was located in his district. The Director of the YIVO Archives, Stefanie Halpern, showed him several artifacts from the collections. The Council Member was particularly moved by the "Entry and Exit" Book from Auschwitz Block 8 and the album signed by school children in the Łódź Ghetto. Following the tour, he also met with Alex Weiser, Director of Public Programs and the YIVO Learning and Media Center, to discuss our current and upcoming programming and the YLMC's launch plans.



# THE JEWISH LABOR AND POLITICAL ARCHIVES

May 25, 1965

### A LETTER FROM THE SPECIAL COUNSEL TO PRESIDENT LYNDON B. JOHNSON TO THE UNITED **HEBREW TRADES**

One of the major collections in the Jewish Labor and Political Archives is the collection of the United Hebrew Trades, a federation of Jewish labor unions organized in New York in 1888 under the leadership of Yiddish journalist Jacob Magidoff; founder and leader of the Socialist Party of America Morris Hillquit; and founder and long-time editor of the Jewish Daily Forward Abraham Cahan.

Established during a time when other smaller Jewish trade unions were struggling to survive, the United Hebrew Trades adopted an early set of principles that promoted mutual support between all unions; helped establish unions in trades that had not yet organized; and spread Socialist ideology among Jewish workers. The UHT became instrumental in helping organize unions and teaching workers how to hold meetings, arrange contracts with owners, keep proper financial records, and organize and lead strikes.

Found in the collection is a letter to William Wolpert, Secretary of the United Hebrew Trades, from Lee C. White, the Special Counsel to President Lyndon B. Johnson. White was an influential figure behind the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which aimed to grant equal voting rights to racial minorities.

In his letter, White acknowledges the importance of the work being done by the United Hebrew Trades as a member of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights. This letter demonstrates that the scope of the UHT's work was far-reaching and extended beyond the Jewish labor movement.



YIVO RECEIVES A \$270,000+ **GRANT FOR THE JEWISH LABOR AND POLITICAL ARCHIVES DIGITIZATION PROJECT** 

The YIVO Institute for Jewish Research is delighted to announce that it has been awarded a grant of over \$270,000 from The Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany (Claims Conference), German Federal Ministry of Finance (BMF), and the Foundation Remembrance, Responsibility and Future (EVZ).

This grant will enable YIVO to process

and digitize approximately 196,000 pages of the Holocaust-related items from YIVO's Jewish Labor and Political Archives (JLPA).

Much of the material was collected by members of the Jewish Labor Bund during World War II, at great risk to their lives, and documents various aspects of the Holocaust and its aftermath, including Nazi atrocities in the extermination camps and ghettos, armed and intellectual acts of Jewish resistance, and the renewal of Jewish life in the immediate post-war period. Materials in the collections include correspondence, manuscripts, newsletters, ephemera, and photographs.

The grant will allow for enhanced description of the Holocaust related materials in the JLPA and their digitization, which will increase their accessibility worldwide. This greater accessibility will, in turn, lead to new avenues for research, documentation, and scholarship; the development of new Holocaust education resources based on previously unavailable primary documents; and greater awareness of the Bund's role in anti-Nazi activities and its covert operations during the Holocaust.

### **ABOUT THE PROJECT**

Consisting of nearly 200 collections encompassing 3.5 million pages of archival documents that were collected by the Bund Archives, the Jewish Labor and Political Archives (JLPA) forms the world's most comprehensive body of material pertaining to Jewish social and political activism in Europe and the United States. Spanning the years 1870 to 1992, the JLPA tells the story of Jews' involvement in the European political and revolutionary movements of the 20th century and resistance to the Holocaust, as well as their impact on the American labor movement and the fight for fair wages and workers' rights. YIVO is now in the midst of an 8-year project to digitize these unparalleled materials and make them available for free access online.

As of July 1, 2024, the JLPA project has raised over \$5.7 million toward its \$8.5 million goal. We welcome your support as we make this historic archival resource available to a global audience. ### THE COLLECTION OF CHARLES ELSON

YIVO recently acquired the collection of Charles Elson (Record Group #2375). Elson was a set and costume designer who designed various Broadway and London plays and musicals, as well as opera performances at the Metropolitan Opera. He also was a college professor, teaching theater at several universities, including Yale University, the University of Oklahoma, and the City University of New York. The collection contains many photographs, richly detailed costume and set drawings, framed paintings of sets, and assorted personal material, including a 1942 University of Oklahoma commencement program and an LP of background music for the play Family Portrait. The Elson collection will be of enormous value to researchers working on theater history, especially in New York City and throughout the Midwest.

YIVO dedicates itself to preserving the rich history of Eastern European Jewry through the archival process and I couldn't be more proud to have been a part of this mission.

### REINTRODUCING MYSELF TO YIDDISH FROM A PLACE OF JOY

Participating in the YIVO-Bard Uriel Weinreich Summer Program in Yiddish Language, Literature, and Culture was an intensive and transformative experience for me. My initial motivation to learn Yiddish was a professional one. As a visual artist, I have spent the past two years reimagining current technologies through the lens of Yiddish culture rather than the prevailing Western culture. To continue my research and artworks in Yiddish, I needed to gain proficiency in the language.

Over the course of these intensive six weeks, I achieved that goal. Yet, what I did not anticipate was the profound personal transformation that would accompany my studies. The program's emphasis on literature and culture helped piece together fragmented parts of my identity that I hadn't fully realized were broken. Growing up in a family of Holocaust survivors, Yiddish was always present in the background of my home, shrouded in code, secrets, and trauma. It was a language that wasn't passed down to me and my siblings, existing instead as a distant echo of a painful past.

Reintroducing myself to Yiddish from a place of joy and appreciation was incredibly healing. I began to reconstruct and understand memories, uncovering a buried heritage that reshaped my sense of belonging. The program helped me fall in love with the language and, more importantly, made me realize that my journey into Yiddish language and culture is just beginning.

Together, we created a vigorous atmosphere that allowed us to study efficiently and praise each other's progress. Beyond the Yiddish language, the Program also encourages students to engage in Yiddish-related research and activities. I wrote my first Yiddish poem Mayn heym (My home) and presented my project From Czernowitz to Beijing: The Influence of Yiddish on the Development of Bai'hua. I won't forget Ben Kaplan's care throughout the program and Dovid Braun's advice for my future career. I hope to experience the same happiness, gratitude, and achievement again next summer.

The lark didn't stop by my window again, but the melody of the Yiddish song lingers. Perhaps she will bring this beautiful language to every home at sunrise.

### ANTANAS ULPIS HUMANITARIAN AWARD COMMITTEE APPOINTED

The YIVO Institute for Jewish Research, together with the Martynas Mažvydas National Library of Lithuania (MMNL), is pleased to announce the appointment of the Committee for the


Antanas Ulpis Humanitarian Award. The award will be given annually for contributions to furthering Lithuanian-Jewish relations and understanding. Award recipients will receive a financial honorarium of \$5,000, a certificate of appreciation, and a public ceremony held in Vilnius. The committee consists of Jonathan Brent, Aušrinė Žilinskienė (Director General of the Martynas Mažvydas National Library of Lithuania), Lara Lempert (Head of the Judaica Section of the Martynas Mažvydas National Library of Lithuania), Arunas Gelunas (Director General at The Lithuanian National Museum of Art), and Alexander Rimas Domanskis (Attorney). The award is named in honor and memory of Antanas Ulpis, the Director of the Lithuanian National Book Chamber in Vilnius, from 1946-1980. In 1948, Ulpis saved thousands of Jewish books and documents from imminent destruction at the hands of the Soviets. The inaugural award is anticipated in 2025.

YIVO CO-HOSTS THE ASSOCIATION OF HOLOCAUST ORGANIZATIONS ANNUAL CONFERENCE YIVO was honored to co-host this year's Association of Holocaust Organizations (AHO) Annual Conference, together with the Museum of Jewish Heritage – A Living Memorial to the Holocaust. YIVO SOUND ARCHIVIST ELÉONORE BIEZUNSKI PUBLISHES CHAPTER IN THE OXFORD HANDBOOK OF JEWISH MUSIC STUDIES



YIVO sound archivist Eléonore Biezunski recently published a chapter in The Oxford Handbook of Jewish Music Studies edited by Tina Frühauf. The chapter, "The YIVO Sound Archive as a Living Space: Archiving and Revitalizing Klezmer," traces the history of the Max and Frieda Weinstein Archive of YIVO Sound Recordings in relation to the revitalization of klezmer music since the mid-1970s. Biezunski tells the story of the establishment of the YIVO Sound Archive in the early 1980s through the impetus of young folk musicians seeking to reclaim the music of their ancestors, particularly the instrumental genre known as klezmer music, in a general context of the "roots movement." As a sound archivist and Yiddish musician, she presents the Archive as more

than simply a repository of documents and possible sources. It is a living space – a historical phenomenon in its own right and a dynamic spatialized territory generated by individuals with their own creativity, caught in a web of social and cultural, intellectual and scientific, institutional and artistic contexts.

### "MEMORIES OF ABSENCE"

### YIVO Study Tour of Lithuania & Poland, June 17-30, 2024

In June of this year, my wife Margaret and I participated in the YIVO educational tour to Lithuania and Poland. Both of us are Ashkenazi Jews of Central or Eastern European origin whose grandparents or great-grandparents had immigrated to the United States between 1870-1910. Neither of us were the children of Holocaust survivors. We were simply curious to learn about the life and culture of the world from which our ancestors had come as well as pay homage to the millions of our fellow Jews who had been murdered in the Holocaust.

We joined a group of perhaps 20 or so fellow travelers, most of whom were the children of Holocaust survivors, including some who had been born in Europe after the war and were returning to the world of their birth. We had so much to learn from them. Accompanying us were Irene Pletka, the Vice Chair of the YIVO Board, YIVO Executive Director & CEO Jonathan Brent, and historian Samuel Kassow, all of whom contributed so much to our understanding of what we were seeing and experiencing.

Our journey took us from Vilnius to Kaunas, Warsaw to Łódź, Lublin to Kraków and, more somberly, from the Ninth Fort to Ponary, Treblinka to Auschwitz-Birkenau. We walked through the haunted streets where our fellow Jews had thrived and then been confined into ghettos by the Nazis before their final transport to death camps. We also visited a number of libraries and archives as well as museums, most notably the POLIN Museum in Warsaw which presented a comprehensive set of exhibits covering the almost 1,000 year history of Jews in Poland.

The trip was somber, emotional, and, at the same time, empowering: how can we possibly understand our present and future place in the world without understanding the history and culture of our grandparents and their predecessors? How can we help to prevent a second Shoah unless we understand the history and unfolding of the Holocaust?

Finally, I am a photographer who has been inspired to create a collection of images from this trip under the title "Memories of Absence." I had no choice but to render the images in black and white - the subject matter demanded that choice. Here are a small sample of images from that collection.
